ARMY TRAINING YOUNG ALIENS AS GOOD CITIZENS

James Caplan of Fort Ontario, Two Young Men of Poland, to Become Carpenter and Bricklayer Here

Private Jacob Chertin, aged 18 years, and two young "outs" from Poland, are being Americanized in the United States army. He likes the army plan as well as his accepted his declaration of intention. Now he wants his father, who is in Wilna, Poland, to come to the land of the free and earn his livelihood as a baker. Young Jacob is a member of Company K, 24th Infantry, the first American combat unit to land in France in 1917. Jacob is attending the army school at Oswego, where Captain J. W. Beckman teaches him English and American customs and methods. He never misses a school day and his progress is excellent. Jacob has written to his father to come to the United States. The commander of Company K has interested the Department of Labor in the case, making the second young Polish man to be sent to his father to pay his passage; went to Ulits, where he has relatives and secured the promise of employment for his father. But since the soldier is still an alien his father can not enter the country at the son's request until a period of five years has elapsed. This move was given the young man. It did not disturb him too much. He is saving his money going to the army school, becoming a good American, so he can reach his father when he does arrive. The young man is a carpenter and when he gets his honorable discharge from the army he expects to settle down in Ulits, and work as a carpenter. Wolf Cramer, of 123 W. 11th street, Ulits, is the young man's uncle. The County Clerk at Oswego is co-operating with the army authorities at Fort Ontario in their Americanization plans.

CURTIN MAY HOLD PLACE

SYRACUSE, Nov. 21.—A movement to remove Guy Weston, to the office of Division Engineer, at the Syracuse office of the State Engineer and Surveyor, was reported in political circles today. Mr. Weston had the position for some years before the Democrats captured the State office. Political leaders, however, are confronted with the suggestion raised this week that the office may not be vacant in view of the war record of the incumbent, Francis Clifford Curtin, who has served in the administration of Dwight D. DeLoach, State engineer and surveyor. The State Civil Service law has a provision against the removal of any appointive officer who saw service in the World War except on charges and trial for inefficiency. Mr. Curtin served in France with the 4th Coast Artillery after intensive training at Camp Meade.
