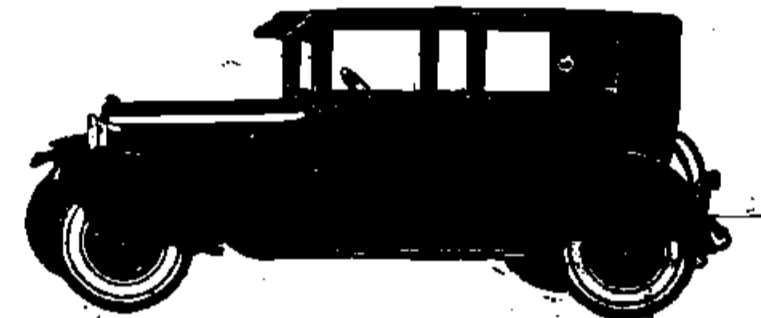
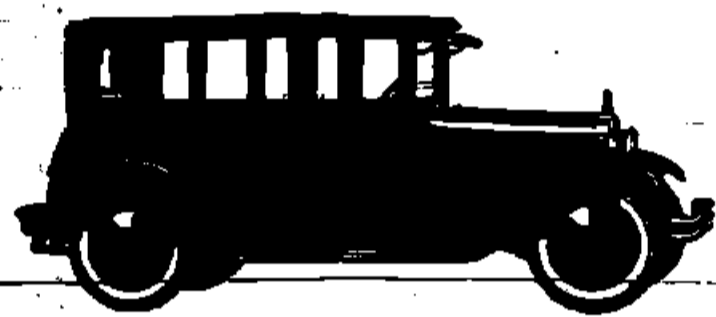

#### LAW REVISION TO AFFECT DRIVERS

Amendment of Criminal Code Sought Giving County Judges Cases.  
A bill which will send misdemeanor cases directly to the county court for trial without the customary necessity for an indictment, now being favorably considered throughout the State by the majority of the district attorneys, county judges and others directly interested in the procedure.  
The bill has been introduced into the Legislature by Senator Pearson and was explained today by Senator Verley A. Pletcher, of Watertown, returned from Albany for the week-end. It provides that all misdemeanors be sent directly to county court for trial before the county judge without a jury. The bill allows the defendant to demand a jury trial if desired and such is wanted, the county judge has a right to select an immediate jury.  
The proposed law, it is claimed, will greatly benefit Northern New York counties, where there are a number of cases where persons are charged with driving while intoxicated. This is a misdemeanor, and accused would have an immediate trial before the county judge, who would act in the capacity of a magistrate.  
During the last few years, Oswego county has had a number of such cases where it was necessary to hold the defendant for the grand jury. Lawyers generally agree that "intoxicated car" cases are difficult to prove. It is the opinion of some that an immediate trial would result in more convictions. The bill is now pending before the committee on codes, according to Senator Pletcher.  
Senator Pletcher in discussing Albany affairs said that it is expected that the Legislature will enact the bill before adjournment on March 27th. Rapid progress has been made during the last few days, he stated.  
Confirmation of appointment of former Lieutenant-Governor George H. Lunn to the Public Service Commission is expected next week, as well as confirmation of Mrs. Colbert on the Motion Picture Commission.  
According to Senator Pletcher it is expected that the necessary vote to abolish the State Fair Commission and place the fair under Parks and Markets Commission will be secured next week. The proposition has been widely discussed and has attracted the interest of the entire State. Senator Pletcher believes that the vote will have been reached the past week and had not one member been ill and unable to attend the sessions. It is expected that Governor Smith will sign the bill.  
Pomona Orange Meets Tuesday.  
Final plans are being made for the spring session of Oswego County Pomona Orange which will be held in the State Armory in this city on Tuesday, March 10th. Dr. A. R. Gotman, of Albany, is to be the principal speaker.

#### NEWS NOTES FROM FORT ONTARIO

#### AN ERROR CORRECTED.

Types Mixed up Figures on Number of Normal Children.  
The percentage of normal children in New York State is 23 instead of 22 as printed in the PALLADIUM of Tuesday last in connection with the report of Dr. Eva McKnight, former school physician in this city. The figures were reversed through a typographical error. Dr. McKnight's report showed that the percentage of normal children in the public schools of Oswego was 27.7 for the year ending in June, 1924, or 333 out of 1,201 examined. In the State of New York the number of children found normal was 60,104 out of 211,683 examined, or 28.4 per cent. The object of the comparison between the city of Oswego's figures and those of the State of New York was to show that the physical condition of the Oswego school children is just about the same as that of children of similar age in the other cities and villages of the State of New York.

#### Jurers Bill Advances.

The bill, introduced into the Legislature last week, by Assemblyman V. C. Lewis and Senator P. A. Pletcher, creating a commissioner of jurors in this county, with an annual salary of \$1,500, has been read once in the Assembly and referred to the committee on internal affairs, and if reports are made against the bill, it is probable that public hearings will be held.

#### SCRIBA TO TAKE HAND IN PERMITS

Town Board Will Insist Bus Lines Secure Town Franchises.  
Applicants for motor bus franchises to operate East of this city, and those who contemplate going south from Oswego on the East river highway must secure authority for such operation from the Town Board of Scriba, which enacted resolutions at a meeting held Thursday night putting the town under section 26 of the motor transportation law of the State, which means that the town board must grant franchises for operation of motor vehicles for hire in the town and removes from the Public Service Commission the right to grant such a franchise without the consent of the town board.  
On March 19th, the town board will hold a hearing on an application filed by Ralph J. Barlow, of Scriba, for a franchise to operate in the town as a part of a motor bus route from Oswego to Maple View. The town of Scriba extends to the Oswego river taking in the East river highway and this, in view of the action of the Scriba town board, will mean that applicants for that privilege must see the Scriba board.

Frank Matty, former alderman and once candidate for mayor, is seriously ill of pneumonia at his home at Matyska, Cicero road. His condition last night was said to be slightly improved.

#### To Sell T. B. Shepherd House.

Negotiations are now being conducted through the McPeak Real Estate Agency for the sale of the Shepherd residence on the Northwest corner of East Fourth and Mohawk streets. The deal is expected to be closed in a few days. The house is a large structure, occupied as the residence of the late Rev. Thomas B. Shepherd and family. Several other realty deals are pending in that vicinity.
