The New York Office has furnished this office with numerous communications addressed to Federal Judge Harold R. Medina, Southern District of New York, U. S. Court House, Foley Square, New York City, written by persons residing in New Jersey. These letters and telegrams protest various phases of the proceedings in the trial of the eleven Communist leaders in New York City who are charged with conspiring to overthrow the U. S. Government by force and violence.

Many of the telegrams were signed by more than one person. Where such is the case, the name of the subject will be followed by the words, "and others."

An "X" after the word "Letter" or "Telegram"indicates the type of communication sent. Where an "H" appears after the word "Letter", this indicates that the letter is apparently inthe subject's own handwriting. It will be noted that this is an excellent source for handwriting specimens.

The captioned subject addressed the below-described communication to Judge Medina. For the exact nature of its contents, reference should be made to the original exhibit which is filed in 100-4284-8D-6

He was awarded the Bradley Prize in Mathematics and the Bogert Prize in Mathematics. Transcripts of the subject's work were sent to numerous medical schools throughout the nation from 1943 through 1945.

On 1/31/55 records of the Credit Bureau of Central N.J., George St., New Brunswick, N.J., were checked by the writer and reflected only that MARY and GEORGE CHERLIN of Osborne Lane, University Heights, were on record with the Credit Bureau as having a good credit rating. Credit Bureau had no further information.

In view of the fact subject of this investigation no longer lives in New Brunswick RA territory, it is suggested that the case be re-assigned to an agent in Newark.

The PSI stated that MARY CHERLIN told her that Dianetics pertained to psychoanalysis by lay men. She explained that one adherent to the theory should be able to audit (a form of psychoanalysis) another adherent.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS

Subject interviewed on 10/11,12/55. Subject furnished background information as is set out in report. Subject advised of membership in CP from 1949 to 1950 or 1951.

Subject advised he subscribed to "Daily Worker" and "The Worker" for period of his membership in CP. Subject advised he was member of IWO Insurance Plan, however, not member of IWO per se. Subject advised he attended approximately four or five classes of the JEFFERSON SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE while a member of the CP. Subject advised he signed petition of Non-Partisan Committee to Defend the Rights of 12 CP Leaders.

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DETAILS:

BACKGROUND

During the course of the interview near the subject's home at 117 Davey Street, Bloomfield, New Jersey on October 11, 1955 the subject voluntarily furnished the following background information.

Residence

The subject was contacted at his residence, 117 Davey Street, Bloomfield, N.J. and subsequently interviewed near his home on October 11, 1955.

Employment

Subject advised that he is employed as a mathematician at the MUTUAL BENEFIT LIFE INSURANCE COMPANY, 300 Broadway, Newark, N.J.

Marital Status

Subject advised that he was married to MARY ELIZABETH MONROE on May 31, 1945, who resides with him.

Military Service

Subject advised that he was a rated electronic technician's mate in the United States Navy from June 1944, until February, 1946.

RESULTS OF INTERVIEW

The subject was interviewed by Special Agents GERHARD MAISEL and RICHARD G. MOHR on October 11, 1955. During the interview, the subject voluntarily furnished the following information concerning his subversive activities as is indicated.

COMMUNIST PARTY ACTIVITIES OF SUBJECT

The COMMUNIST PARTY (CP) has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The subject advised that he joined the CP while in Rutgers University in 1949 and left the CP in 1950, He stated that he joined the CP as naturally as one would join a fraternity and he could not remember if he were recruited or if he inquired and subsequently joined on his own initiative. The subject went on to state that meetings were held monthly in various members' homes and that he paid \$1.00 for one year and dues of ten cents per month. He advised that his attitude

was such that he considered his CP associates to be "a nice bunch of people interested only in people's welfare." He stated that he thought that on that basis it would be all right to "find out what the CP was all about." He stated that the group seemed to be looking for justice toward people and because of that he became interested and subsequently joined. He advised that he does think that the CP, to which he belonged at Rutgers, was not as harmful as the CP today seems to be; however, he left the CP because of the alarming tings printed in the newspapers. He stated he, therefore, drifted away from the CP.

CHERLIN advised that at the time he was in the CP he felt that he was "a political babe in the woods.'" CHERLIN advised that he could not recall the names of anyone connected with his CP activities. However, he stated that he would endeavor to think of the situation and notify the interviewing agents when his memory was somewhat refreshed.

On October 12, 1955, the subject, accompanied by his wife,, voluntarily appeared at the Newark FBI Office and and advised Special Agents RICHARD G. MOHR and ALFRED K. NICHOLAS that he wished to tell more concerning his subversive activities. On this occasion he stated that he does not think the CP group of which he was a member was harmful compared to what the CP stands for today. He stated that the group held no secret meetings, was interested only in equality for everyone and talked of nothing which had to do with revolutionary movements or espionage. He further stated that he feels that the CP group to which he belonged was not typical because they only talked of peaceful means and theories to arrive at the equality which is due to man.

FRONT GROUP ACTIVITY

The National Committee, COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, in issuing its final text of the "Resolution Growing Out of the Presidential Elections" in "Political Affairs" issue of July, 1953, states in substance that in 1948 the COMMUNIST PARTY helped stimulate the formation of the Progressive Party and correctly supported the Progressive Party through the 192 elections. It then states:

"However, the mistake our Party made was to confuse this task with the historic task of forming a new mass party of the people. As a consequence, there existed the wrong estimate that the formation of the Progressive Party represented something more than the simple emergence of an important fighting force for peace; that it represented the emergence of a great mass people's Party."

As a result of this reasoning, the resolution concludes that the "Progressive Party, the CP and other progressive forces" must unite in a broad, mass-front coalition.

The subject advised that he was a member of the Progressive Party from 1947 to 1950 or 1951 and attended meetings at various members homes. He advised he also attended one meeting at the Mosque Theater in Newark. He stated that the Progressive Party was like the CP in so far as both were looking for justice, equality and peace for all men. He advised that the Progressive Party was another group not unlike a fraternity affair and he just drifted away from it in 1950 or 1951.

On subsequent interview on October 12, 1955 the subject advised that he could offer nothing supplemental relative to the Progressive Party activity.

INTERNATIONAL WORKERS ORDER

The INTERNATIONAL WORKERS ORDER has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The subject stated that he was never a member of the IWO as such, but he did take the IWO insurance while in the CP. He advised that he attended no activities or meetings of the IWO, therefore, never considered himself to be a member of the organization.

LITERATURE

"Daily Worker" and "The Worker"

"The Worker" is the Sunday edition of the "Daily Worker", an east coast Communist newspaper.

The subject advised that he subscribed to the "Daily Worker" and "The Worker" for the period that he was a member of the CP (1949-1950) and he advised that he actually disliked the paper very much. He stated that after he left the CP he did not renew his subscription.

OTHER ACTIVITIES OF SUBJECT

Attendance at Training Schools of CP JEFFERSON SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE

The JEFFERSON SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The subject advised that he attended approximately four or five meetings of the JEFFERSON SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE in Newark, N.J. while he was a member of the CP. He stated that it was in the form of a series of lectures. However, he could recall nothing more regarding the school or its activities.

MISCELLANEOUS

The subject advised that in 1949 he signed a petition for the Non-Partisan Committee to Defend the Rights of the 12 CP leaders.

T-1, who has furnished reliable information in the past advised in October 1949 that he believed the above Committee to be a Communist front organization organized solely for the defense of the CP leaders who had been convicted for conspiracy to teach and advocate the overthrow of the Government by force and violence.

T-2 and T-3, who have furnished reliable information in the past, advised in 1949 that the Non-Partisan Committee to Defend the Rights of the 12 CP Leaders was formed at a "Bill of Rights Conference" held in New York City, July 16, 17,1 1949. The Conference was supported by the CP and the CP guided the preparation for the Conference.

The subject advised that he considers himself loyal to the United States even though he was a member of such a

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group as the CP. He stated that he can now see his mistake and, if necessary, would fight on the side of the United States against any subversive force. The subject stated that his activity is now directed by those conditions which are in complete accord with the best interests of the United States. He further stated that he would appreciate another interview in a week or two, during which time he will endeavor to think out his past activities and recall something more specific regarding individuals and dates.

On 10/11/55 the subject was interviewed by SA GERHARD MAISEL and SA RICHARD G. MOHR and on 10//12/55 by SA ALFRED K. NICHOLS, JR. and SA RICHARD G. MOHR.

On 10/11/55 the subject was contacted at his residence at 117 Davey Street, Bloomfield, N.J. and interviewed in Bureau car a short distance from his residence. Proper precautions were exercised to insure security of interview.

On 10/12/55 the subject voluntarily appeared at the Newark FBI Office accompanied by his wife MARY.

During the course of the initial interview the subject advised that he was a member of the CP from 1949 to 1950 and a member of the Progressive Party from 1947 to 1950 or 1951 while a student at Rutgers University. He stated that he attended monthly meetings of the CP at the various members homes and paid a yearly fee of \$1.00 and dues of ten cents monthly. He advised that he became interested in the CP because "they" seemed to be a "nice bunch of people interested only in people's welfare" and he thought it would be "all right to find out what it was all about." The subject advised he left the CP as a result of the alarming things which were printed in the newspapers relative to the danger of the CP to our society.

On 10/12/55 the subject, when interviewed at the Newark Field Office, furnished substantially the same information as before; however, stated in addition that the CP group to which he belonged held no secret meetings and never talked about anything which had to do with revolutionary movements or espionage.

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On initial interview the subject advised he was a member of, and attended, Progressive Party meetings from 1947 until 1950 or 1951 while he attended Rutgers University. He went on to state that the Progressive Party was like the CP in that both were looking for justice, equality and peace for all men. He stated he drifted away from the Progressive Party in the same manner he drifted away from the CP.

The subject advised that he subscribed to the IWO Insurance Plan during the period of his membership in the CP, but he stated that he was never a member of the IWO itself.

The subject advised he subscribed to the "Daily Worker and "The Worker for the period that he was a member of the CP and did not renew his subscription after he left the CP. The subject advised that he attended approximately four or five meetings of the JEFFERSON SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE in Newark while in the CP but he advised he could recall nothing specific regarding the school.

In conclusion the subject stated that in 1949 he signed a petition in support of the National Non-Partisan Committee to Defend the Rights of the 12 CP Leaders.

It should be noted that during the course of the interviews the subject could not recall the names of individuals connected with any of his activities in these subversive groups. However, he stated that he desired another interview in a week or two during which interim he will endeavor to recall more specifically the names and dates relative to his subversive affiliation.

He advised that he considers his activity in the CP and other front organizations a mistake and stated that he considered himself to be loyal to the United States in every respect. He stated that he would, if necessary, fight on the side of the United States against any subversive group.

OBSERVATIONS AND COMMENTS

The subject appeared to interviewing agents to be sincere and straightforward in his answers to questions directed to him inspite of his inability to recall specific

names of his associates. He expressed an attitude of cooperation and a desire to be of assistance to the ${\tt FBI.}$

Inasmuch as the subject was cooperative and requested another interview, this case is being placed in a pending status and results of subsequent interview will be submitted with appropriate recommendations.

On November 8, 1955, the subject, upon request, was reinterviewed by ALFRED K. NICHOLAS, JR., and RICHARD G. MOHR. The above-mentioned interview was conducted at 117 Davey Street, Bloomfield, New Jersey, the residence of the subject. Proper precautions were exercised to insure security of interview.

During the course of this interview, the subject stated that he had reviewed his past subversive activities and could add nothing to supplement that which he had already furnished. CHERLIN, however, did furnish information relative to the subversive activities of his associates while he was a member of the COMMUNIST PARTY.

OBSERVATIONS AND COMMENTS

The subject, throughout the interview, appeared to the Interviewing Agents as sincere. He was cooperative and cordial, however, he indicated that he would not jeopardize his station in life again buy having any subversive connections or affiliations.

CHERLIN reiterated the fact that he was concerned about his employer finding out about his past subversive activities. In view of the above fact and also that he advised that both he and his wife are periodically receiving psychiatric treatment, it is not believed that he possesses those qualities necessary to warrant development as a Security Informant. Information furnished by CHERLIN has been properly disseminated to the various investigative case files concerned and proper dissemination to the Bureau and interested offices and other agencies has been made and any necessary investigative action has been taken.

On November 8, 1955, the above-named subject was, upon request, reinterviewed by SAs ALFRED K. NICHOLAS, JR., and the writer. The interview was conducted at 117 Davey Street, Bloomfield, New Jersey, and proper precautions were exercised to ensure maximum security of interview.

During the course of this interview, the subject stated that he had reviewed his past activities in conjunction with his wife MARY CHERLIN (NK 100-40189) and believed that relative to his own activities he could furnish nothing further than he already had. He stated that while in conversation with his wife, he and she were able to recall information relative to names of people whom they knew to be COMMUNIST PARTY (CP) members.

CHERLIN stated that the following individuals were members of the CP during the period of his own CP membership, 1949 to 1950. In each instance he attempted to furnish identifying material relative to these individuals during the time of their CP membership. LOU ARKY

CHERLIN stated that LOU ARKY was a student at Rutgers University, New Brunswick, N.J., and had recruited him into the CP.

RUBIN, MORDECAI

CHERLIN stated that RUBIN was a Rutgers University Student.

Information regarding LOU ARKY has been furnished to the Applicant-SGE squad to Relief Supervisor RUFUS T. TYSON, who stated he would handle this dissemination.

Information regarding JOE SEWARD (NK 100-29374-33-2) reflects that one JOSEPH N. SEWARD, a Rutgers University student, refused to sign a loyalty pledge in connection with the University ROTC Program in 1949.

Information regarding FLORENCE HOFFMAN (NK 65-859-1005-9) reflects that one FLORENCE HOFFMAN, 386 Rutherford Boulevard, Clifton, N.J., was on a mailing list of the Midvale Camp Corporation, Ringwood, N.J. in May, 1955.

The subject of this case is may be identical with an individual whose name appeared on a 3 x 5 card in an index file in the possession of PHILIP KRAMER, security subject of this office. These cards comprised an alphabetical list and a geographical list of names. The cards in both lists contained the name and address of an individual and, in the majority of cases, a Chapter and County listing. A portion of these cards contained information as to the occupation of the individual whose name and address is set forth on the car. On a number of other cards appeared various notations, such as:

"Dues Paid"

- "1947-1948"
- "Joined 1948"
- "Membership and Donation"
- "Dues and Donations"
- "Member of League since the beginning,

has contributed each year"

"Contributed each year, Attends dinners, Membership and Donation"

At the time these 3 x 5 cards were secured, this office also obtained miscellaneous records from the same source. Included in these miscellaneous records were the campaign finance records pertaining to the WALLACE-TAYLOR presidential campaign of 1948. It may be noted that both WALLACE and TAYLOR were Progressive Party candidates in that election.

A review of the names which appear on these cards reflects that a great many of the persons listed actively participated in Progressive Party activities during 1948 and in the years immediately subsequent. It is further noted that in checking these names against Newark indices, a great number of them have been ascertained to comprise active CP members in this State.

The predecessor (in 1947-1948) of the Progressive Party in New Jersey was the Independent Citizens League, which became known in 1948 as the Independent Progressive Party, and whose officers and members were predominantly CP leaders, members sympathizers.

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Photographs of these cards have been made and are filed in 100-33011-186. The name of captioned individual appears on page 123 of these photographs.

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If this information is reported in any subsequent communication in this file, it is suggested that the following phraseology be used. It may be noted that this phraseology has been employed in reporting this material in connection with loyalty and applicant-type cases.

In 1948 HENRY WALLACE and GLEN TAYLOR were PROGRESSIVE PARTY candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States, respectively.

Dr. HARVEY RICHARD, 1003 13th St., Bay City, Michigan, advised SA LEWIS L. WRIGHT on 5/14/51 that he served in the Navy from 1944 to October, 1955 with PHILIP KRAMER. He stated that while they were on ship together KRAMER left a lot of Communist literature in the ship's library and from his talk he appeared to have definite Communist leanings.

The above-described index file contained ... (refer to photograph in above exhibit, page for complete details as to this card).

The significance of this card index file is not definitely known.

T- (former), who has furnished reliable information in the past, has advised that the INDEPENDENT CITIZENS LEAGUE became known as the INDEPENDENT PROGRESSIVE PARTY in June of 1948.

According to T- KATHERINE VAN ORDEN and MORTON BLOOM were Vice-Chairman and Executive Secretary, respectively; both of whom were known to the informant as members of the COMMUNIST PARTY.

T- (former CS ______), who has furnished reliable information in the past, has advised that the PROGRESSIVE PARTY of New Jersey was formerly known as the INDEPENDENT PROGRESSIVE PARTY and that the majority of PROGRESSIVE PARTY functionaries were COMMUNIST PARTY members.

The COMMUNIST PARTY has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450..
